


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## **Introduction to Outcome Budget**

One of the fundamental discourses surrounding public policies revolves around the efficacy of budget outlays in translating into tangible outputs, specifically in terms of services provided to the populace. This scrutiny extends to evaluating how these outputs contribute to the overall improvement in development outcomes for both the citizens and the nation.

Conventional budgetary documents typically provide a financial overview, offering information solely on the allocation and expenditure under various budgetary heads. However, there is a need to nurture an open, accountable, proactive, and purposeful style of governance by transitioning from mere 'outlays' to the result-oriented 'outputs' and 'outcomes' through outcome-oriented budgeting. The adoption of outcome-oriented budgeting, as exemplified by the Outcome Budget Statement (OBS), is imperative for ensuring that public resources are directed towards clearly defined goals. This approach not only fosters transparency and accountability but also enables efficient monitoring of the progress made in achieving desired outcomes.

The Outcome Budget Statement (OBS) serves as a pivotal budgetary instrument, aligning expenditures with specific goals by explicitly stating the intended outputs and outcomes associated with each expenditure. The primary objective of the OBS is to facilitate greater scrutiny of budgets earmarked for specific goals.

### **Outlay - Output - Outcome Framework**

#### **Outlays**

The financial resources deployed for achieving certain outcomes.

Example: Funds for school education

#### **Outputs/Services Delivered**


These are tangible products and services that are delivered to the beneficiaries as part of the scheme / programme.

Example: Number of schools constructed

#### **Outcomes**

These are the short to mediumterm effects, which is a precondition to accomplishing the long-term goal/objective.

Example: Improvement in enrolment ratio, Improvement in learning outcomes



# **Section II**

### **Outcome Budget Framework in Assam**

The Government of Assam introduced the practice of formulating the Outcome Budge Statement alongside the conventional budget for the first time in the financial year 2017-18. This initiative was undertaken with the objective of enhancing transparency and accountability in the utilization of public resources, as well as to fortify efficiency in governance.

Prior to the first Outcome Budget Statement, in 2016 Assam had already established itself as the first state in India to adopt Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) thereafter becoming the maiden state to adopt budgeting focusing on the SDG outcomes as outlined in Assam Agenda 2030. This was the first step towards achieving the 17 SDG goals by 2030.

Assam is one of the first Indian state to have adopted the guiding framework of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) in structuring its Outcome Budget.

Assam's Outcome Budget has been aligned with the SDG framework and their associated targets. Formulated in close collaboration with the SDG Cell of the Government of Assam, it adheres to the principles of the 2030 Agenda and the SDGs. As per the latest report on SDG India Index 2020-21 from NITI Aayog, Assam is categorized as a performer state with a score of 57.

To ensure outcome-oriented budgeting process and a meaningful Outcome Budget Statement, a series of workshops have been organised with various administrative departments to sensitize them about the framework including building awareness around how departments should set realistic and measurable targets for every activity they plan to carry out in the financial year 2024-25. Assam's Outcome Budget Statement has evolved since its introduction in 2018-19.

# Structure of Outcome Budget 2024-25 and Methodology Followed

The principal aim of this document is to reflect upon the state's explicit commitments to Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and their corresponding targets in quantifiable terms. In conjunction with detailing the financial allocations for departmental schemes, the Outcome Budget document also encompasses projected outputs and outcomes of these schemes/programmes. In order to achieve Assam Vision 2030 and map the developments made under different areas, the departments have been grouped under thirteen budgetary thematic areas.

#### **Mapping Schemes to Sustainable Development Goals**

Efforts have been made to link every scheme/programme operational in the state to one (or more) SDGs to map the contribution of scheme-level outcomes to the achievement of SDGs. Each budgetary allocation has been linked to outcomes that align with Assam Vision 2030 and the State Indicator Framework, formulated in accordance with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Expenditure items directly associated with one or, in certain instances, more than one of the 17 SDGs and their corresponding targets will be appropriately labelled with the corresponding SDG and Target.

The mapping of schemes to SDGs is undertaken exclusively for schemes categorized as either State Owned Priority Development (SOPD), Centrally Sponsored Schemes (CSS), or other schemes that do not fall under Establishment Expenditure (EE).

Based on the reporting by various departments under each thematic area, it is interesting to see the contribution of each thematic area towards multiple SDGs.


